Miss the least?



The winter days when you get up in the dark, arrive at school in the dark, leave school in the dark and get home in the dark.


Enabling parents.

Miss the least?


I won't miss grading all of those papers and the endless stream of deadlines. Ugh!

Miss the least?


The block system.

Miss the least?


Schedule changes, counselor changes, stuff at night, stuff during the day, cranky people, cranky me.

Miss the least?


PAPERWORK!!

Miss the least?


The drive to school. Driving on Route 53 and 190 to get here was a daily challenge.

Interaction with colleagues and students.






