# What will you miss the least?



I definitely won't miss waking up at 4:40 a.m.; nor will I miss dealing with recalcitrant students.


#### Words of wisdom?

# What will you miss the least?


The student drivers who made my day the most exciting, especially during the winter months.

# What will you miss the least?


Driving to school in horrendous winter weather hoping that my students and I will arrive safely.
